This year the AGNS team once again demonstrated resilience as we brought the world's best art experiences to Nova Scotia, while also responding to unexpected interruptions to our operations. Our team opened five new exhibitions and partnered with institutions and artists around the globe to bring world renowned art and artists to Nova Scotia. We worked with The Power Plant Contemporary Art Gallery to showcase artists from the

Arctic and the Amazon in the exhibition Arctic/Amazon: Networks of Global Indigeneity and McMichael Canadian Art Collection to present some of the most iconic Canadian and Indigenous art works, past and present, in Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art. We collaborated with Arts Nova Scotia to exhibit Nova Scotian artists at the Western Branch, and community partners and schools across the province to bring art experiences into communities.

A particular highlight was the implementation of the free access pilot program, which allowed Nova Scotians to visit for free during Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art.

During this pilot, the Gallery saw a 78 percent increase in visitation over the same period last year and 24 percent of those were first time visitors. We heard from people who had never visited the Gallery about how art had stirred unexpected emotions or sparked conversations between friends.

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This pilot was an important way to increase access to art and the provincial collection by eliminating financial barriers for residents of Nova Scotia.

When infrastructure issues forced the Gallery to close in February, our team re-imagined ways to bring in-gallery activities into communities, 'popping up' in perhaps unlikely venues like the Halifax Shopping Centre or on the Halifax Ferry.

The AGNS also strengthened its international reach through a partnership with the National Gallery of Canada to jointly acquire a major work by New York/Cape Breton artist Joan Jonas. The work, titled Moving Off the Land II, made its North American debut at MoMA in March. Jonas has spent summers on Cape Breton Island since the 1970s, an area that has heavily influenced her decades-long artistic practice.



It was a strong year for the AGNS and I look forward to working with our team and community to make 2024-25 even stronger.

Free Access Pilot Program

> In celebration of the exhibition Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art, the AGNS implemented a pilot program extending free access to all residents of Nova Scotia from October 13, 2023, to January 14, 2024.

This free access pilot not only played a pivotal role in enhancing access to art and cultural experiences, it also promoted interactions with art, and provided educational opportunities through the arts.

The program demonstrated support for local artists, heightened visitation rates, bolstered civic pride, reinforced the AGNS brand, and fostered enhanced community support for the visual arts.

The pilot program reflects the vision of the AGNS to increase access to art, strengthen the creative economy, and help nurture more engaged and healthier communities.

Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art

Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art told the story of one family's visionary engagement with Canadian and Indigenous art. This exhibition braided together works by early European newcomers like Cornelius Krieghoff; titans of Canadian 20th century art, the Group of Seven, Tom Thomson, David Milne and Emily Carr; a rich display of works by the Quebec Impressionists, as well as Automatiste painters Jean-Paul Riopelle and Paul-Émile Borduas; and works by trail-blazing artists of today, including contemporary Indigenous artists Kent Monkman, Brenda Draney, Brian Jungen and Annie Pootoogook, as well as leading international artist Peter Doig.



Curated by Sarah Milroy, this exhibition explored the theme of the North Atlantic, its role in history, and its impact on artists' imaginations. It laid out a panorama of Canadian creativity past and present, revealing landscapes, personal narratives, and vivid revisions of Canadian history.





Arctic/Amazon: Networks of Global Indigeneity

This exhibition explored the ways in which Indigenous contemporary artists and collaborators from around the world tackle issues of climate change, globalized Indigeneity, and colonial encounters within the circumpolar Arctic and the Amazon during times of crisis. Indigenous ways of knowing and being in relation to the land were a major source of the artists' creativity.

The works represented a politics of resistance and resurgence while also revealing their connections to the Arctic or the Amazon.

With work on view that included painting, drawing, sculpture, installation, video, and performance, the 16 artists featured in the exhibition shed light on current geopolitical and environmental issues that have informed artistic practices in these two vastly different, yet interconnected, regions.

Centuries of Silence: The Discovery of the Salzinnes Antiphonal

Opening in Namur, Belgium, this exhibition returned an incomparable treasure of cultural heritage - a manuscript that disappeared and was forgotten for centuries: the Antiphonary of the Abbey of Salzinnes.

The Salzinnes Antiphonal is an illuminated choir book in the collection of the Patrick Power Library, Saint Mary's University, Halifax. Originating from the

Cistercian Abbey of Salzinnes on the outskirts of Namur, it was made in 1554-1555 for the former cantrix and prioress, Dame Julienne de Glymes. In addition to the history of the abbey, the exhibition revealed many secrets of this remarkable manuscript. This exhibition premiered at the AGNS in 2017 before making its way to Belgium in July 2023.

This showcase of recently acquired works by artist Carol Wainio allowed visitors to experience her paintings that draw upon fables and folktales from across popular culture while adding new layers of meaning to these stories. This exhibition will remain on view into 2024-25.



Inner/Outer Space

At the Western Branch, the AGNS once again partnered with Arts Nova Scotia to showcase works from the Nova Scotia Art Bank. The exhibition featured artwork from seven contemporary artists who built resilience through a broader in-depth exploration of different kinds of relationships.



Ta'n a'sikatikl sipu'l Confluence

This Permanent Collection exhibition, the Mi'kma'ki Artists' Spotlight, and the (Tea)chings space each saw new artists highlighted.

(Tea)chings

(Tea)chings is a space for artwork created through Indigenous-centered programming by community members of all ages. This year's (Tea)chings space showcased paintings created by high school students from We'koqma'q Mikmaw School on We'kogma'g First Nation, a Mi'kmaw community in Cape Breton, NS. Through a series of ArtsSmarts workshops, artist Whitney Gould and teacher Alexis Bati inspired

each student to create a painting about knowledge they hope to pass down, after studying artwork by Daphne Odjig.

ArtsSmarts brings artists and students into collaboration and is supported by Arts Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotia Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, with generous sponsorship by Scotiabank.

Meagan Musseau is an L'nu woman from Elmastukwek Ktaqmkuk currently living in Unama'kik. Her works explore themes of kinship, harvesting, connection to territory, and matriarchal empowerment through several artistic

mediums such as basketry, textiles, land-based performance, and video.



2023-24 PROGRAMS

AGNS programs help make the Gallery an inclusive gathering place and enhance access to experiences with art.

This year, the AGNS hosted numerous programs for people of all ages. Through hands-on activities, lecture-style artist talks, engaging artist performances, pop-up art-making, and collaborative partner programs, audiences were able to experience art through a variety of opportunities.

Make Day!

The Make Day! program delivers art workshops that teach visitors art techniques or processes and leads them through a short activity.

Hosted by AGNS staff, artists, and art educators who bring rich technical, creative, and process-based approaches to the sessions, the hands-on activities offered during Make Day! support key exhibitions on view at the Gallery and current events.

HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDED:

-Crafting fishhook sculptures inspired by the work in the exhibition Arctic/Amazon: Networks of Global Indigeneity, led by artist Natalie Laurin.

-Exploring weaving with paper to introduce ideas related to Mi'kmaw Basketry.

-Creating compositions based on paintings by the Group of Seven, led by artist Meggie Richards.

-Wet-paper painting workshop that looked to the work of David Milne with artist Kawama Kasutu.

-At the Western Branch, facilitator Susan Pfeiffer drew on themes from the exhibition Inner/Outer Space to offer various studio activities including accordion books, clay hearts, and dioramas.



March Break

The AGNS 'popped' up throughout communities with art-making activities during our temporary closure. Highlights included partnering with Wonder'neath Art Society to offer DIY shoe charms and Open Studio stations, button making at the Halifax North and Dartmouth North Public Libraries, art on the Alderney ferry, and a painting workshop at the Halifax Shopping Centre.

This approach allowed the AGNS to provide access to art experiences during March Break while the Gallery was closed.

ADULT WORKSHOPS

The AGNS welcomed more than 200 participants this year in an expanded series of adult workshops, which included specialized artmaking and painting.

Linocut Cards and Printed Tote Bags

Artist Tayla Paul led participants through the basic techniques of linocut and design. Visitors carved their own designs and created unique greeting cards and tote bags.

Rug Hooking

Artist Deanne Fitzpatrick taught participants the basics of rug hooking. Inspired by Deanne's own abstract landscapes and bright colours, they began their own hooked rug projects.

Felted Landscapes

Looking to the Group of Seven's sweeping and colourful landscape paintings in the exhibition Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art, participants in artist Nancy Keating's felted workshop were inspired to create their own needle-felted landscapes.

Painting & Pints

Artist Meggie Richards received a warm welcome back for the ever-popular adult painting nights, Painting & Pints. Participants loved the iconic landscape paintings of artists Emily Carr and Tom Thomson, as well as Maud Lewis favorites.

French Tours

In partnership with Alliance Française Halifax, the AGNS co-hosted two French guided tours of travelling exhibitions on view. Participants were able to experience exhibitions in a group tour, which promoted conversation, curiosity, and French language through the visual arts.

Nocturne

In partnership with Nocturne, the AGNS hosted three artist talks with Roda Medhat, Corrie Peters, and Erasure Art Collective prior to the main event.

During Nocturne, the Gallery hosted three special projects and welcomed almost 2,000 visitors. Special projects included BLACKOUT 2.0 by Erasure Art Collective, Echoes Calling Back by Jordan Bennett, and Blueberry Cake by Melissa Peter-Paul.

Key Frames: Kent Monkman

This year, our film screening series invited attendees to experience Monkman's largescale paintings on view in the exhibition Generations: The Sobey Family and Canadian Art before engaging with the artist's films that further explored topics of colonization, sexuality, loss, and resilience.

Pride Art Jam! with the Youth Project

In partnership with the Youth Project, the AGNS hosted a drop-in Pride Art Jam for 2SLGBTQIA+ youth, who were invited to paint and make buttons and prints that celebrated 2SLGBTQIA+ joy and histories, led by facilitator Raphael Chipman.



Halifax Chamber of **Commerce Fall Dinner**

In November, the Halifax Chamber's Fall Dinner shone a spotlight on the art industry in Halifax, highlighting the profound impact arts and culture have on a city's growth, identity, economy, and social fabric. With 600 people in attendance, Permanent Collection works came to life on the big screen throughout the evening, and CEO Sarah Moore Fillmore spoke about the impact that art has on the provincial economy, place-making in our city, and on our well-being.

This year, we were honoured to acquire 52 artworks from 31 artists. We continue to work on expanding and further diversifying the provincial collection to broaden our narrative, fortify the work of artists within the region, and better reflect the AGNS vision and brand.

Acquisition Highlights

Joan Jonas, Moving Off the Land II

This year, the AGNS had an incredible opportunity to jointly acquire a major work by New York artist Joan Jonas with the National Gallery of Canada. This work, titled Moving Off the Land II, made its North American debut at MoMA in March 2024.

Jonas began her career in New York's vibrant downtown art scene of the 1960s, where she was one of the first artists to work in performance and video.

With Manhattan as a home base, Jonas has sought retreat in the highlands of Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, since the early 1970s, an area that has heavily influenced her decadeslong artistic practice.


Moving Off the Land II presents the ocean as a threatened ecosystem, a repository of mythology, and a site for transformational encounters with animal life. The work, which draws inspiration from Jonas' time spent by the ocean in Cape Breton, is a multi-media presentation that includes videos, theatre structures, print reproductions, cast glass, and Murano glass mirrors.
