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Message from the Director






Acquisitions and Collection

The Gallery collects, preserves, and exhibits visual arts for the benefit of residents and visitors to Nova Scotia. Over 17,000 works are currently in the Permanent and Study Collections. New works are added by donation, bequest, and purchase.

The curatorial staff and Acquisition Committee continue their careful and considered approach in adding significant artworks to the collection. Among the exciting acquisitions are pieces from the Winkworth collection of historic Canadiana, supported by John Risley, Sir Christopher Ondaatje, John Oyler and Movable Cultural Property.

Engaging People with Art

Visitors at the Yarmouth location increased this year by 30% percent, illustrating the excellent community involvement, engagement and support in Yarmouth. Visitor numbers to the Halifax location declined slightly this year primarily due to lower than usual attendance at city-wide events like Nocturne. Projections for 2016-2017 point to an increase based on robust strategic marketing and exhibition offerings, with an increased focus on social media and digital platforms.

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

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We're sitting on such rich content, so [a new blog] was the perfect opportunity to start a new community.




